## Autism Spectrum Disorders:

## Reading Amelia Bedelia

Station 1 – minimum of 1 adult, a second is always good for crowd control

Purpose:

to help students understand the difficulties that ASD

people may have in understanding language

Materials:

Amelia Bedelia by Peggy Parrish

Set Up:

students may sit at a table or on the floor

Procedure:

leader will read <u>Amelia Bedelia</u> and discuss the nuances of colloquial language which ASD people find confusing – e.g. "dress the chicken", "put out the lights"

People on the Autism Spectrum often have trouble reading facial expressions and body language, as well as understanding the complexities of spoken and written language. Amelia Bedelia is a humorous way to show students how taking language very literally can cause social difficulties. The kids often remember reading the book as a younger child but join in on the humorous aspects. This is a simple way to give them a 'first pass' at understanding the complex issues of autism.

Hot tip:

children may ask if Amelia has ASD - no, but maybe the person

who wrote the book knew someone who did
