CORNER

When does a school feel like a home?

The answer to this question lies in how faithfully a school embodies practices and cultural habits that serve to connect each student to the institution and to each other. Part of this connectedness results from the environment itself; educational research tells us that when they see themselves in posters, displays, and curricula, and when they are immersed in positive messaging, students feel safer as learners and as individuals in their school.

With this idea at the forefront, we unveiled a display of 103 national flags arranged in glorious fashion in the commons to begin the school year. Celebratory yet dignified, the flags draw the eyes upward and immerse the room in color and light. As our students study, socialize, and eat throughout the day in this space, they are now surrounded by Wayland High School's own Hall of Flags.

This project was conceived two years ago as our staff contemplated ways to make more deliberate efforts to represent the growing diversity of our student body. Those outside Wayland may underestimate the ethnic and racial diversity in our schools: at the high school, our student population is reported as 4.7% African American; 16% Asian; 4.4% Hispanic; 5.5% Multi-Race; and 69.3% White. Far beyond the data and statistics, however, we value and appreciate the multitude of family backgrounds and histories that interlock to comprise our school community.

This past January, we asked each of our students in Advisory to identify up to four countries that represent their family heritage. After tabulating the results, our master list contained 103 countries. What followed was a sustained effort by Assistant Principal Jim Nocito to research vendors, check and double-check our massive order, and then painstakingly oversee the installation of the display. Thanks to 2018 graduate Peter Moore, our resident expert on the world's flags, each one was inventoried and hung properly from its own staff. Then, in August, all 103 flags took up lofty residence in the commons just in time to welcome back all staff and students.

This past week, one of our students told Mr. Nocito: "I never felt at home at Wayland High School until I saw my family's flag." This comment, affirming in its honesty and emotion, is also a reminder of the seemingly small yet integral ways a school can become a home, and should ever strive to be one.

Welcome back!



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GUIDANCE HOURS AND COUNSELOR DROP-IN HOURS:

Please note that these times are reserved for non-personal questions/issues such as basic questions about the schedule, school day, PSAT/SAT/ACT questions, college application questions, transcript request questions, and/or to schedule appointments.

The WHSPO newsletter is a vital communications line between our department and parents. In addition to the WHSPO Guidance News and the E-news mailings Ms. Mizoguchi will do, there is a wealth of information for both students and parents on our Guidance website.

PSAT REGISTRATION – DEADLINE APPROACHING

As a result of meeting the College Board's deadlines for ordering PSATs earlier and earlier each year, we need you to be aware of a few very important pieces of information and most importantly our firm deadline:

- The PSAT is a test geared toward juniors and therefore, most do usually take it in the fall of their junior year. However, some sophomores choose to take it for practice as well.
- Wayland High will be offering the PSAT to 10th and 11th graders in October only.
- Sophomores are allowed to take the test, but our experience is that many do not. We recommend your child speak with their guidance counselor about this decision.
- The PSAT will be administered on Saturday, October 13, 2018.
- Registration is now open on line. The final deadline for signing up for the test is Friday, September 28, 2018, but it is less expensive to sign up prior to September 14, 2018.
- The cost of the test is \$30 if you pay by 9/14; \$45 if you pay after 9/14.
- You can sign up and pay your fee on line at the <u>WHS Testing site</u>.

NINTH GRADE AND SENIOR PARENTS: DON'T FORGET YOUR HOMEWORK!

In an effort to know your student best, we ask you to write us a "brag sheet" about your ninth grader or senior. Although counselors will be meeting and getting to know your ninth graders in Freshmen Seminar and individual meetings throughout the fall, we would love to hear from you about your child: their strengths, weaknesses, interests, hobbies, passions and anything you feel would be important for us to know.

REMINDER TO SENIORS: SENIOR SEMINARS ARE IN YOUR SCHEDULE!

Our Senior Seminars will begin on September 18 (starting with an A-day) and will run for three cycles.

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COURSE CHANGE DEADLINES

All parents are also reminded that students may not enter a year-long course in a different subject after approximately four weeks into the course. This year the deadline is Friday, September 28. In addition, students may not drop any course during the last two weeks of any quarter. And students who choose to drop a course after 50 percent of the course has elapsed, a grade of "W" (for withdrawn) will show on the transcript.

COLLEGE VISITS AND SCHOLARSHIP ANNOUNCEMENTS

Juniors and seniors are again able to sign up through Naviance for meetings with college representatives that visit WHS Guidance. Students are reminded that they must get written permission to attend from their teacher if they must miss class time. Students can access the form on the guidance website or in the guidance office. Scholarship notices will also be available through Naviance.

FREE ONLINE SAT PREP through <u>KHAN ACADEMY AT THE COLLEGE BOARD SITE IS HERE</u> FREE ONLINE SAT AND ACT PREP THROUGH NAVIANCE:

Juniors and Seniors have access to Method Test Prep for free ACT and SAT prep as well. Students log on to their <u>Naviance Student</u> account to access their accounts, or open a new one.

NCAA UPDATED GUIDELINES:

For any student or family that may be considering playing a Division I or Division II sport in college, please visit the NCAA Eligibility Clearinghouse website for new information on eligibility. Some colleges begin recruiting students as early as sophomore year, so it is important for students and families to be aware of how to register with the NCAAA and what the eligibility requirements are (specific classes, GPA and testing requirements, recruiting rules, etc.). FROM THE HEALTH ROOM

Welcome back everyone. And to first time Wayland High School parents, welcome to WHS! I hope everyone had a restful and rejuvenating summer break.

I'd like to begin by encouraging you to contact me at any time, and for any reason at all. Any and all information regarding current and past medical issues helps to ensure that I can provide the best care possible for your kids.

Following is an overview of various testing and paperwork needed to comply with state and local requirements, and general information to ensure timely and appropriate care for your student in the event of an accident or illness.

For all

- Please make sure that all information we have regarding health issues and emergency contact names and numbers is updated and accurate. If there are changes that need to be made you can get in touch with the main office or me for help.
- We require written permission from parents for all medications given at school. You have the opportunity to give permission for the administration of Acetaminophen (ie: Tylenol), Ibuprofen (ie: Advil, Motrin), antacid, and antibiotic ointment, on the emergency contact information form. For all other medications we require both a parent signature and a physician's order. You can access those forms through the HS web page/ For Families/ Health Services. Links to the forms can be found at the bottom of that page.
- For those students who have been prescribed an EPI-PEN, PLEASE send in required paper work which includes: 1) a current doctor's order 2) signed permission from a parent. We are using new forms this year, so if you haven't received one in the mail, let me know and I'll send one out to you.
- I do not collect students' personal Epi-pens in my office. I ask that your student carry their Epi-pen on them at all times , including during field trips and for away games with a sports team.
- Re: sports physicals; MIAA rules require that an athlete show proof of a physical exam done within 13 months of the entire current season. It is possible that your child is eligible to begin a specific season but not complete it if the 13 months falls before the season is over. If you are unsure of the date for the last physical on file, please contact me and I will check. It's heartbreaking to have to deny any student the opportunity to participate! To avoid any interruption or delay in your student's sport season, feel free to send in a copy of the physical exam as soon as it is done.

	9 th graders /e are required by the state to perform a postural exam to screen for scoliosis. This is he last time that exam will be performed in the school setting. With the help of the eachers in the Wellness Dept, I usually do this screening in the spring. If your student is hecked by their own health care provider, and you would prefer that we not screen hem, please send in a note stating that your student is screened by their personal ealth care provider, and requesting that we not perform the exam. Feel free to send in heat note at any time.
	10 th graders tate law requires that we have proof of a physical exam done within the last year. If ou haven't done so already, please send a copy of a physical exam done after Sept 017. If you have an appointment scheduled in the near future, just let me know the ate, and forward a copy after the visit.
	earing, vision, height, and weight measurements are also required at this grade level. ccording to the Massachusetts Body Mass Index (BMI) Screening Regulation passed in pril 2009, schools must collect the height and weight of students in grades 1, 4, 7 and 0, and use that information to calculate their BMI. BMI is a measure that is used to how a person's "weight for height for age." Just like a blood pressure reading or an ye-screening test, a BMI can be a useful tool in identifying possible health risks. You ave the right to exclude your child from the BMI screening. Please notify me in writing you choose to do so. Results of the hearing and vision testing will be mailed home only they fall outside of the normal range. This screening will likely be done during late inter/early spring.

SPIRITED GREETINGS, STYLISH FALL FASHIONS, AND SENIOR CLASS CHANTS: IT MUST BE THE FIRST WEEK OF CLASSES! ALWAYS GREAT TO SEE THE SMILING FACES AND FEEL THE INFECTIOUS ENTHUSIASM THAT ACCOMPANY THE NEW YEAR.

Last year's primary history-centered initiative was Wayland METCO's 50th anniversary; this round we anticipate spending time on a handful of themes, including, of course, the 2018 election season. Without exception, social studies-business teachers regularly invest quality time linking past and present with the goal of building the habits and knowledge-base of informed citizens. Additional themes will likely include a history wing "timeline tunnel" featuring American immigration, a WWII era local history biography project, and the conclusion of a multi-year phase-in of our updated 9th and 10th grade course sequence. Briefly, in order to allocate a more appropriate amount of time to the non-western world and modestly decrease the emphasis on US history (which is accentuated at every level of the district), the transition will conclude in an unusual 9-10-11 grade configuration and effectively produce two 3-semester courses.

Instituted last year, the 9th grade class begins with the non-West. *The Modern World* includes focused case studies rooted in China, India, the Middle East, and Sub-Saharan Africa. Students research and write short essays and one substantial paper, which is modified annually, but recently has had students investigating conflict resources, like the African diamond, palm oil, cocoa, and petroleum industries.

Beginning with our sophomores this week, the updated version of *The Old World and the New World* will divide the year into two distinct semesters, *20th Century Europe* and *Case Studies in American Democracy*. The first half of the year will be an extension of *The Modern World*, but with a focus, of course, on Europe. After mid-year exams, the course will then change to a case-study version of USI. The four major units will include "1491: pre-Columbian world" (spotlight studies of certain areas); "17th Century New England and the Chesapeake Region: Two Distinct Societies"; "The Constitution" (major unit on how and why it was drafted, as well as civics studies of the living doc of our times), and "Jacksonian America" (on the various aspects of the 1820s-30's reforms/policies). Our sophomore team has spent a great deal of time this summer preparing for the forthcoming changes.

The new three-year sequence will conclude with our juniors in *US History II* (1840-present), which is either thematically- or project-based.

As previously written, while an unconventional approach, we expect that this new sequence will help reconcile the inevitable tension between depth of study with breadth of coverage and the corresponding choices of inclusion and omission, all the while keeping sharp focus on our school's mission and department's emphasis on 21st century skills.
