CORNER

With midyear exams this week, several things are true: (1) casual wear becomes the attire of choice among students as they arrive clad in sweats for the sole purpose of taking exams; (2) campus is as quiet as a ghost town by noon, with staff hunkered in all corners either grading exams or meeting with students; and (3) Winter Week is just around the corner!

As many of you know, Winter Week is one of the most distinctive and abiding traditions at Wayland High School. While its exact form and content has varied over the years, its primary and historic purpose is to kick off the second half of the school year with experiences outside the norm for students and staff following the stressful period of exams. Prominent speakers, interactive events, and student performances provide our school community with important ways to learn and come together.

The vast responsibility to take on the vision of Winter Week and coordinate a menu of events is traditionally the domain of Student Council. To me, this is the most impressive part of Winter Week: the planning and execution of the week -- and thus its relative success or failure -- falls largely on a group of elected student leaders. That the institution bestows so much trust and influence on its students is a signal of our student-centered mission and a nod to the original vision of Winter Week: this experience is for students, by students.

This year, led by Student Council President Amanda Armstrong and Vice President Gage Fuller and advised with clarity and purpose by math teacher Eric Wolven, this diverse group of 14 students has prioritized a vision of having fun while bringing students together and learning new things. Under the "bringing students together" heading, one focus of Student Council is to offer an extensive lineup of student performances to highlight the many talents of their peers. Hence, next week's schedule is packed with student music, dance, a capella, and theater performances, capped off by an all-school student and staff Talent Show on Friday. This opportunity to celebrate the hidden talents of their peers and teachers -- and some of them are quite amazing and surprising! -builds community and school spirit like few events can.

Learning about new and pressing issues is another theme of the week. In years past, Winter Week speakers have entertained us, made us question, and inspired us. We have hosted government officials, university professors, entertainers and artists, and figures from the world of professional sports. This year, we are proud to welcome Reverend Mariama White-Hammond, a prominent figure in the Boston landscape (she was profiled in the August 2017 edition of Boston Magazine, among other publications) who will discuss the intersection of social justice and environmentalism. Her honest, open, ebullient style will surely connect with our students and push our thinking on these important topics.

After the coming week of midyear exams, Winter Week offers a unique change of pace that has been treasured for literally generations of students. At the same time, it is not without its challenges. With its multiple bell schedules and quickened pace, the week can feel disorderly and chaotic; additionally, we trade valuable instructional time for activities that may not be of interest to everyone. Some events may invite unwelcome controversy (I am thinking now of a certain Olympic bobsled-themed film) or may lack the power we had hoped for. Winter Week has assumed a reputation of nearly mythic proportions which can serve us well, or can result in feelings of disappointment or entitlement among students. Like all school traditions, Winter Week has multiple layers of complexity and truth.

With good planning, a clear vision, and student leaders who embrace the responsibility, I believe Winter Week is worth the risk. In our Mission Statement, we declare our values of "personal and civic responsibility, love of learning, and empathy for others"; we seek to deliver on that promise each day for our students, inside and outside the classroom. In important ways, Winter Week aligns with our mission and can enhance our students' experiences as learners, citizens, and members of our school community. I look forward to a week full of spirited and educational moments with students and staff alike.

#### Senior Independent Projects

The Senior Independent Project (SIP) Program is available to members of the Class of 2019. SIPs started at WHS with the graduating class of 2010. The program's goal is to let motivated seniors create their own projects to be completed during the last quarter of their senior year. Seniors may explore a creative interest and/or a vocational possibility that their previous classroom work did not address. Projects have included building a boat, assembling a co-cart, building a smoker and experimenting with smoking meat, studying a variety of religions, genealogical research, & much more.

We've found that taking responsibility for designing their own projects has been a huge motivating force for the students that have participated so far. Parents of these students say that they have never seen their children so excited about what they were doing, nor so dedicated to the work they had set for themselves as they were in their last term at WHS.

Interested students should do some brainstorming about exactly what their project might be. Deciding on a field of interest, such as art, music, education, computers, scientific research, a craft, or a form of community service, is the first step. More challenging is coming up with a workable project that will fit into the last six weeks of the school year and then finding an internship or a mentor to help the student accomplish the goal. The initiative for the project needs to come from the student, but parents can suggest people or places to call to set up informational interviews in a field of interest.

The students will be given more information about the program at the Senior Class meeting on Tuesday, February 26. For more information, have your student talk to one of the co-directors of the program.

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# REMINDER: FINANCIAL AID INFORMATIONAL OVERVIEW IN BOSTON FOR PARENTS OF OUR BOSTON STUDENTS:

As per your invitation emails, please join us and Gregg Cohen from Campus Bound for an informational meeting. We will meet on February 7 at the Horizons for Homeless Children's Center at 1705 Columbus Avenue, Roxbury. We hope that this session will help you to understand the process, to think about the financial aid process in relation to your son's/daughter's future planning search, and know what to expect come next year. Topics to be discussed will include:

- How colleges determine how much you will receive in financial aid and/or scholarships
- What to do when you are offered grants and scholarships
- Loans and paying options if the scholarships don't go far enough

### VISITING NEW ENGLAND PUBLIC COLLEGES THIS SPRING/SUMMER?

If so, take note of this cost savings program. The New England Regional Tuition Break Program allows students from Massachusetts to attend other New England colleges for state tuition rates for certain majors that are not offered at any of our public colleges or universities in Massachusetts. ### MID YEAR EXAM INFO FOR ALL (ESPECIALLY FOR 9TH GRADERS AND THEIR PARENTS/ GUARDIANS):

Most ninth graders have never taken an exam that covers a semester's worth of material. Through advisory, classes, and individual conversations, students will be reminded of the following information. We would also ask for your partnership in discussing this with your ninth graders. As always, please call your student's Guidance Counselor if you have questions. Exams for all will be January 22 through January 25.

- Mid year exams are designed to be 1-1/12 hours long, but every student gets two hours to complete their exam.
- Students come to school during exam week to just take exams; there are no classes that week.
- The first exam is from 8:00 AM to 10: AM. The second exam session is from 10:15 AM to 12:15 PM.
- Most students have one exam per day on three of the days and one day with two exams. If your student takes six classes, there may be two exam days on which they have two exams.
- There are two bus runs on each exam day except on Friday: one following the first exam, and the second run after the second exam. Regular bus runs also occur at 2:15 (and 1:05 on Wednesdays). There will be no second run on the Friday of exams.
- There is no lunch served on exam days. There are snacks available before exams and in between exam periods.

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# EVENING PROGRAM FOR PARENTS JUNIORS – FUTURE PLANNING PART 2 (SOPHOMORE PARENTS WELCOME TOO):

Mark your calendars for the evening of **March 21, 2019, 6:30** PM. Our department is consistently looking to stay on top of trends and improve our programming and, as a result, we will be offering an additional evening program this year to support our students and families throughout the future planning process instead of waiting until the early fall of senior year. This is also in direct response to the increase in the number of our students who are applying to schools through early plans, (early decision, early action, rolling, etc.), and we want them and you to be well prepared with the information you both need. We are calling this program Future Planning Night Part 2. Part 1 is in January when we bring in a panel of admission representatives to speak about the college admissions process as a whole (see above date and description). For our "Part 2" program, we hope to get much more specific with helping our families understand how we work with our juniors and what we cover with them through our Junior Seminars and individual meetings. This evening will include mini-demonstrations of programs our students utilize throughout the future planning process such as Naviance, Big Future, and Common App. Additional topics will include admissions testing (SAT and ACT), as well as discussions around building a college list, early applications, deadlines and keeping the process healthy. We hope you will join us for this very informative night.

### CONTINUED NEW FORMAT FOR SENIOR PARENT PROGRAM FOR THE FALL OF 2019

Following our two future planning programs this winter/spring semester, we will continue to offer support to parents/guardians through the fall. Instead of one large evening meeting for parents of seniors, we will be offering morning Q&A sessions for parents who want/need more information and support on the process. These sessions will be co-led by at least two counselors, and our hope is to offer one per week between mid-September and early November. More information will be coming to you later in the spring and over the summer. As always, if you have questions about any of this process, please call your son/daughter's guidance counselor.

#### **SENIORS**:

- Some seniors are just beginning the future planning process. Please know this is completely fine! Counselors are ready and willing to meet with any senior or parent to help them get started on thinking about the future.
- Seniors who have already applied Please do not forget to write a heartfelt thank you note to the teacher(s) for the hard work they do for you inside and outside the classroom and throughout the future planning process, including things like writing your teacher letters of recommendation and editing your essays.
- Seniors who have already applied Please be sure to update your counselor with your decisions and update your decisions in Naviance too. Counselors want to know what you are hearing and how we can continue to help.
- Please be sure to pay your transcript fees. Your first request was free, and each request after that is \$5.00. You can check in Naviance to determine how much you owe. Please see Mrs. Fratto or your Guidance Counselor with questions or to make payments.

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• Guidance will be sending midyear transcripts after midyear exam/quarter grades are complete. It is our hope to get those out just before the winter break. So, when colleges call or email your students asking for these grades, please let them know to expect them in mid to late February.

#### • Financial Aid Information

In order to receive financial aid from a college or from the Wayland High School Scholarship Committee, students and parents must submit the Free Application for Federal Student Aid Form (FAFSA). If you have not already, you can begin your FAFSA by going online to <u>www.fafsa.ed.gov/</u>.

- FAFSA Days Massachusetts 2019: Free assistance to students and families seeking to complete the FAFSA. Financial aid administrators and high school counselors will be on hand to help college-bound high school seniors complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) free of charge. - Wayland Scholarship Reminders:
  - The Wayland Scholarship applications will be available in Guidance and on the high school and guidance website soon.
  - To be eligible for the Wayland Scholarships, you must submit a FAFSA.
  - Once the FAFSA is filed, you will receive via email a "Student Aid Report" (SAR) that will include your "Estimated Family Contribution" (the EFC). This information is required to complete your Wayland Scholarship application.
  - The deadline to apply for the Wayland Scholarship will be March 29, and applications cannot be accepted or processed without the EFC or if you miss the March 29 deadline.
  - For more detailed information on the Wayland Scholarship Committee process and applications, please visit the <u>Wayland High Scholarship link</u>.
- State college and university scholarships to be aware of:

- The 10th annual Career Colloquium is coming on June 5. Juniors will be discussing their career interests in seminars, and will make their selections there as well, for their top choices of career workshops to attend.

### NINTH AND TENTH GRADERS:

- 9th graders are just completing their seminar sessions. We are asking that students now schedule appointments with their individual Guidance Counselor to get to know each other better if they haven't already. Please encourage your 9th graders to schedule those appointments.

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## The Guidance Corner

#### Ways SBIRT Can Help

- Helps teens/adults to understand the impact/risk of alcohol and drugs
- $\bullet$  Opens a dialogue that can improve overall health and safety
- Reinforces and supports continuation of safe choices
- Helps identify at risk students for substance related problems and provides resources for these students

#### Logistics of our plan

- All Counselors, Nurse Amy Schoeff and administrators were recently sent to trainings to prepare, thanks to a grant for early adopters, of which Wayland was one.
- Our SBIRT planning team includes members of our Health Department (Amy Schoeff and Ruth Mori), the whole Counseling Department, Administrators and Wayland Cares staff.
- We are screening sophomores because we see from data collected by the Metrowest Health Adolescent Survey that there is an increase in use between grades 10 and 11.
- Next step of the plan will involve the middle school to screen all of our 8th graders.
- We are in the planning stages and are aiming to do all of the screenings during the week prior to April break -- we hope to screen all 200 sophomores in a 5-7-day period, mostly before April break (at the start of the new term and then "stragglers" after the break).
- Students will be scheduled for a specific appointment time and will be taken out of class for 10-15 minutes to be screened.
- There will be an Opt Out Form sent to parents in case for any reason you do not want your son or daughter screened.

#### What's involved in an SBIRT screening will include:

- Brief "what do you know" survey about substance issues (pre-test)
- Brief <u>CRAFFT Tool assessment</u> (brief written survey): asks questions about their own usage over the past 12 months. Ex: Have you had any alcohol (more than a few sips) over the past 12 months? Have you ever ridden in a car with someone who is high or under the influence of alcohol?
- An individual interview with each sophomore by a member of the SBIRT relating to the CRAFFT survey
- If screening with CRAFFT necessitates further information, there is a longer discussion utilizing BNI counseling principles (Brief Negotiating Interviewing (BNI) includes: open-ended questions, affirming and reflecting their responses, and summarizing their responses for clarification and confirmation).
- Resources and referrals for treatment will be discussed and parents will be informed.
- We are required by the state to document the number of positive and negative screens, but they are all anonymous -- no names or identifying information is shared with the state.
- Negative screens have no follow up at all.
- Brief exit survey about what they learned (post test).
