PRINCIPAL'S CORNER

ALLYSON MIZOGUCHI

When I was a junior in college, I took a course in computer programming as part of a distribution requirement for graduation. For an English major whose mindset was firmly entrenched in literature and writing, I remember this experience as both terrifying and illuminating.

I confess that I can't recall anything specific about the course--even what programming language we used--but I have vivid memories of rubbing my temples as I tried to force my brain to think in a different way. This did not come easily to me. Stringing together commands in order to achieve a particular output required skills vastly different than those I had honed in my area of study. During that term, I never became fluent or confident in programming, and I didn't find a new passion or talent; however, I staggered my way through the course and ended up broadening my mind. One or two new neuropathways may have been created that sometimes flicker and sputter today.

I reflect on my brief foray into computer science as I think about the course selection and scheduling process in which we are currently engaged. During this time of the school year, we gather course recommendations and requests from each student and, after a careful and iterative review of this information, build next year's master schedule from scratch. This process began last month, when your student's academic teachers recommended him or her for course placement for the 2019-20 school year. Generally, this accounts for four or five academic areas of study (English, math, science, social studies, and world languages). Beyond this core of courses, your student hopefully chose from a menu of elective courses including arts and drama, business and current events, journalism and innovation that offer new ways of thinking and creating.

Like the menu at the Cheesecake Factory, our Program of Studies can seem to offer such a rich wealth of options that it is hard to be selective. During the last few weeks, we have encouraged our students to make choices that enrich their experiences while keeping their studies, and their lives, healthy and manageable. Signing up for too many courses not only threatens to overwhelm a student's life balance (sleep, stress, ability to focus, capacity for exploration), but in a very technical sense it can create conflicts during the scheduling process. A student's overall course balance -- the number of honors and Advanced Placement courses, the exact combination of elective courses -- is a reflection of each individual's set of interests and strengths. It is also realized through much conversation between students and their teachers, their counselors, and their parents.

I can attest to the enormous benefits gained by students who carefully select one area of risk or challenge, such as taking a theater arts course if they are averse to speaking in public or an honors history course if they have met the prerequisite but aren't sure how far to extend. High school is a time to reach outside one's comfort zone and try something new (ceramics, creative writing, forensic science). It is also a time to be thoughtful and self-aware when choosing courses in areas of study that might be more challenging. "Where will I find support if I need it? How do I spend my time outside of school? What are my academic strengths and weaknesses right now? How do I handle stress? In what kind of learning environment am I most engaged?" are the kinds of questions students might ask themselves as they make these choices.

During the next few weeks, counselors and department chairs will be reviewing course requests and our scheduling architects will start to build the master schedule. If your student is still uncertain as to his or her requests for next year, there is still time for those vital conversations with both teachers and counselors. Looking ahead to 2019-20, we hope our students (like the English major taking a computer science class) will be enriched by opportunities to discover new skills and neuropathways in a purposeful and manageable way.





WANTED: Your Happy Hollow memories - Help us celebrate Mr. Lee.





SENIORS AND JUNIORS:

- The 10th annual Career Colloquium has been rescheduled for June 5, 2019. Please remind your juniors to make their selections for careers through the Naviance link if they have not done so already.
- Shout out to all Juniors and Seniors and their parents: As you know, college has become incredibly expensive. In response to that, our state college system has worked diligently to devise a plan to make four years of college much more affordable. Please check out this link that includes both a video introducing the program, and provides plenty of information about the program on the web page too. Commonwealth Commitment.
- Seniors: Please be sure to pay your transcript fees. Your first request was free, and each request after that is \$5.00. You can check in Naviance Student to determine how much you owe by clicking on the Colleges tab, then click on the Colleges I am Applying to, click on Manage Transcripts, scroll to the bottom to see how much you owe. Please see Mrs. Fratto or your Guidance Counselor with questions or to make your payment.
- Senior Boys: The United States Selective Service System wants us to remind parents and seniors that young men ages 18–24 can register on line at <u>www.sss.gov</u>.
- ●Seniors: Please remember to see your counselor with what news you have heard or what we can help you with if you are still unsure of what you want to do next year. Gap year questions, waitlist questions, internships and employment questions please come to see us, and we will do our best to help in any way.
- Seniors/Parents of Seniors: Please be sure to either add your acceptances and denials to Naviance on your own, or to ask your counselor to do so. This will make the senior sign out process go much faster and smoother!

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●Interested in Gap Year programs? Although some local gap year fairs have already happened, here is a great site for gap year events and resources. <u>USA Gap Year Fair</u>

●Scholarships: Private scholarship notices are posted to Naviance and on file in the Guidance office.

Two other great resources for scholarships include <u>Fastweb.com</u> to search for scholarships and <u>mefacounselors.org</u> for a wealth of information on the financial aid process.

● Wayland Scholarship Reminders:

- ★Although the Wayland Scholarship applications were due into Guidance on March 29, some students still need to hand in their FAFSA notifications – this indicates your family's "Estimated Family Contribution" (the EFC).
- ★The Wayland Scholarship Committee cannot process your application without this information.

● Visiting New England Public colleges this spring/summer? If so, take note of this cost savings program. The New England Regional Tuition Break Program allows students from Massachusetts to attend other New England colleges for state tuition rates for certain majors that are not offered at any of our public colleges or universities in Massachusetts. So if your senior is interested in a unique major, check out the resources at the following link: <u>2019-20</u> <u>Tuition Break Information.</u>

● Massachusetts State college and university scholarships also to be aware of:

- \star Please visit the guidance website and click on the link named <u>Koplik and Adams</u> <u>Award Programs</u> in order to review the eligibility guidelines for each scholarship.
- ★If you are a senior and have questions about your eligibility and/or application process for these awards, please call or email our Koplik/Adams coordinator, <u>Ben Buffa</u> at 508-358-3706.
- ★For Juniors, Mr. Buffa will be sending Koplik invitation letters and application information on or around April 5. These will not be due until be due May 1 of your senior year. This allows you to think about whether or not to take SAT Subject tests in June of your Junior year (which is a requirement for the Koplik).
- Junior packets were due into Guidance on March 29. If your junior has not handed theirs in yet, please encourage them to do so. These packets are important to us because they help the students to begin to reflect and communicate about themselves during the future planning process. In addition, the information is extremely helpful to the counselor who will be writing a comprehensive letter of recommendation for each student who applies to schools and/or organizations they plan to pursue.

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Free online SAT and ACT tutoring online is available to juniors through their Naviance account. Its name is Method Test Prep. Sophomores received access in March when sophomore seminars began.

● For All Seniors:

- ★There are often a few areas of confusion this time of year: the waitlist, the deferral procedure, and multiple deposits.
- ★Please see your guidance counselor with questions about the waitlist and the deferral. There are procedures to follow we can help you with.
- ★We <u>strongly</u> advise against "double deposits," (the act of depositing at two schools in order to hold two spots rather than choosing just one school to attend), as this is both unethical, and it delays the student's decision-making process, while also withholding a spot from someone that might have a chance to come off of a waitlist.
- ★Seniors are once again reminded that college offers of admission are contingent upon successful completion of their senior courses.
- ★Beware that with a serious downward slide in grades since the time of acceptance, students may hear from a college because they want you to explain your downward trend. And unfortunately, at times, if your downward slide is serious, and your explanation is not a strong one, then they may also decide to rescind their offer of admission. Don't let this happen to you. Stay consistent and continue to work hard.

RISING JUNIORS AND SENIORS (CURRENT 10TH AND 11TH GRADERS):

● If you are interested in being a Peer Mentor, please read the qualifications and description of a Peer Mentor carefully before signing up as the role has changed over the past few years. Here is the link to the information on being a Peer Mentor. Applications will be available in early April. After it becomes available, applications will be due into Guidance by Friday, May 3.

NINTH AND TENTH GRADERS:

- Ninth and 10th graders are being encouraged to schedule appointments with their individual Guidance Counselor to discuss course selection and to continue to get to know each other better.
- As per last month's WHSPO News, all sophomores will be undergoing the SBIRT screening during the week of April 8. SBIRT Stands for Screening, Brief Intervention, Referral to Treatment. For more information, please visit this link that briefly explains the screening to students, and/or call your son/daughter's guidance counselor. You can also check out this link (quite similar) which is our SBIRT explanation for parents. Please also be on the look out for an opt out letter coming to you from our principal in case you are considering not having your child participate in this health screen.
- Sophomore Seminars are wrapping up on April 12, and sophomores now have access to their Naviance accounts. Through the seminars, students were introduced to career investigation through a few resources we shared with them: <u>Naviance Student</u>, <u>O*Net Online</u>, the <u>Mass.</u> <u>Career Info System</u> (MassCIS) and <u>Sokanu</u>.
- Free online SAT and ACT tutoring online is available to sophomores through their Naviance account. Its name is Method Test Prep. Sophomores received access through their sophomore seminars. Accessing SAT and ACT Method Test Prep online allows students to do test preparation activities at their convenience. These activities include:

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★Listening to audio explanations of test questions
★Accessing strategy guides for each test
★Completing full-length practice tests
★Receiving hundreds of practice questions
★Reading easy explanations for every question

★Tracking strengths on each test

★Receiving valuable test-taking tips

★Taking practice quizzes to boost knowledge

ALL STUDENTS:

●SAT Subject Tests:

- ★Although most colleges do not require subject tests, some of our students take them when they complete a course they do not plan to continue further (Biology, Chemistry, Languages, etc.).
- ★Some students take them later in their high school career because they can be used as one measure to qualify for the Koplik Scholarship, which can be used at any Massachusetts State college or university (see information above relating to the Koplik Scholarship)
- ★If you are planning to take a Subject Test, you sign up on line at collegeboard.org
 ★If you take a subject test, you can opt for what's called score choice. This means that you can choose to send your scores to colleges in the future or not. For more information on score choice, click here.


