

Principal's Corner

A lthough March is a long month (the common complaint about March is that it has no three-day weekends), it is also a month of change and momentum: the weather improves, we turn the clocks ahead, spring sports begin, and planning ramps up for Prom and senior events. Additionally, six months before the start of the next school year, we are in the beginning stages of an intricate cycle that culminates in the creation of next year's master schedule.

This month, students in grades 9-11, along with their families and teachers, will engage in the course recommendation and request process for the 2020-2021 school year. In fact, for the last couple of weeks, our teachers and counselors have been connecting with their current students about course options and recommendations for next year. As students contemplate their strengths, areas of growth, and the other interests in their lives, we encourage them to have these vital conversations with their teachers, counselors, and parents about next year's program of study.

This week teachers are entering course recommendations into eSchool, which will be viewable by students and families starting on March 13. The ultimate aim for each student is a balanced and enriching academic schedule that provides appropriate rigor, that cultivates new passions, and that still allows enough time and energy for family, friends, and outside interests. Next week I will be emailing parents a more detailed informational letter about this process, but I'd like to underscore the following points here as well:

- As you and your child make decisions about next year's courses, please consider the overall time commitment that your child's courses will require, especially as they relate to other activities (clubs, job, music, athletics, etc.) that he or she is involved in. While there is no predictable formula for the amount of time required in each course, we will use a "Time Management Activity" template in Advisory (and will email you a copy) to help students evaluate their time commitments. We encourage you to use this template as a guide for conversations with your child.
- Please trust in the recommendations of your child's teachers. Through their experiences with your child in the classroom throughout the year, they know his or her skills, strengths, and areas of growth, and are well versed in the sequence of courses in their discipline. If you have any questions or would like to discuss your child's placement in any course, please feel free to contact the teacher directly.

PRINCIPAL'S_____ Corner

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Although our schedule features eight possible periods in a six-block daily rotation, please remember that we consider students' schedules full when they are taking five academic majors (English, math, science, social studies, and world language) and Wellness. Many students are able to take one additional elective per semester, for a total of six courses plus Wellness. This load allows for enough unscheduled blocks that a student can still meet with teachers, study in the Library Media Center, visit with friends, and unwind in between classes. Taking more than six courses can be difficult from a scheduling perspective, and in some cases, can compromise a student's healthy balance.

• Please remember that a large part of the high school experience for our students is coming to understand who they are as learners. To this end, we encourage you and your child to select courses that will of course highlight and build on strengths, but also that will address particular areas of growth. In short, we advise that your child enrolls in the courses that are most suited to her or his needs, and that best propel your child forward once those needs are met.

This month we will build in many check-points for you and your child in this process, during which you will review recommendations, make elective requests, and then review those courses once again before we begin building next year's schedule from scratch. Although we are very much immersed in the events and energy of the current school year, it is fun and exciting for us and our students to begin envisioning next year. We will keep you apprised of this process!

FROM THE HEALTH ROOM

I want to apologize for my absence from the last few issues of this newsletter. For some reason I just kept missing deadlines..

In case you missed the e- blast sent out before vacation, I'd like to remind everyone that for many weeks now we have been seeing a lot of kids with **flu-like illness**.

We are clearly in the midst of **flu and cold season**. Although many students are staying home, I have been seeing quite a few kids with high fevers at school. Please make sure that if your student has been ill, they remain home until they are feeling better and are fever free (without fever reducing medication) for 24 hours. If your child appears to be unwell, know that it may just be the beginning of what could turn into a full blown illness. In that case, I ask you to err on the side of caution and keep them home that day.

I've also been seeing kids who have recovered from a recent illness but still not feeling 100%. Some are so exhausted that they can barely make it though a full day of school. Please encourage your student to **stay home** until they feel truly strong and are fully recovered.

Following are some **guidelines** to follow if you are unsure whether to send your student to school.

- If your child has vomited due to an illness; they should remain out of school for a minimum of 24 hours after vomiting has ceased.
- If your child has a fever of 100.4 degrees F or higher; they should remain out of school for 24 hours after the fever is gone without fever reducing medication.

• If your child has been treated with an antibiotic for a contagious infection; they need to be on an antibiotic for at least 24 hours before returning to school.

As I'm sure you've heard by now, the best ways to help **stop the spread of germs** and prevent respiratory illness like the cold and flu includes;

1) handwashing with soap and water if possible, and hand sanitizer in the absence of soap and water.

2) Avoid close contact with someone who is ill.

3) Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when coughing or sneezing, throw the tissue away, and then wash your hands.

- 4) Avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth
- 5) Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces especially when someone is ill.

6) Stay home when sick.

If you are interested, I still have **flu vaccine** at school for our kids. Forms are available on the HS web site For Families/Health Services.

• Once **warm weather** arrives, I plan to begin the postural screening for all 9th graders. If your student is checked by their primary care provider and you would like to opt out of this state mandated screening please send a note requesting such.

• **Spring sports season** begins on 3/16 and I want to remind you to send in an updated physical exam before that date to avoid your student missing out of tryouts. An up to date physical is one done within the last 13 months.

EVENING PROGRAM FOR PARENTS OF JUNIORS (SOPHOMORE PARENTS WELCOME TOO):

Mark your calendars for the evening of **March 19, 2020, 6:30 PM in the lecture hall**. Our department is consistently looking to stay on top of trends and improve our programming, and as a result, we will be offering an additional evening program this year to support our students and families through the future planning process instead of waiting until the early fall of senior year. This is also in direct response to the increase in the number of our students who are applying to schools through early plans, (early decision, early action, rolling, etc.), and we want them and you to be well prepared with the information you both need. We are calling this program Future Planning Night Part 2. Part 1 was in January when we brought in a panel of admission representatives to speak about the college admissions process as a whole. For our "Part 2" program, we hope to get much more specific with helping our families understand how we work with our juniors and what we cover with them through our Junior Seminars and individual meetings. This evening will include mini demonstrations of programs our students utilize throughout the future planning process, such as Naviance Student, Big Future, and Common App. Additional topics will include admissions testing (SAT and ACT), as well as discussions around building a college list, early applications, deadlines and keeping the process healthy. We hope you will join us for this very informative night.

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FORMAT FOR SENIOR PARENT PROGRAM IN THE FALL OF 2020

As noted above, more and more of our students begin their future planning process earlier now, so we have adapted our future planning programming. Our two evening programs (in January and March) will cover the bulk of information you and your students need to know to begin the future planning process. Then in the fall, instead of one large evening meeting for parents of seniors, we will be offering morning (and a few evenings) Q&A sessions for parents who want/need more information and support on the process. These sessions will be co-led by two counselors, and our hope is to offer one per week between September and November. As always, if you have questions about any of this process, please call your son/daughter's guidance counselor.

SENIORS AND JUNIORS:

- Seniors: Please be sure to pay your transcript fees. Your first request was free, and each request after that is \$5.00. You can check in Naviance Student to determine how much you owe by clicking on the Colleges tab, then click on the Colleges I am Applying to, click on Manage Transcripts, scroll to the bottom to see how much you owe. Please see Mrs. Fratto or your Guidance Counselor with questions or to make your payment.
- 2020 AP testing will take place at WHS for two weeks in May.
 - ✦ Testing begins Monday, May 4 and finishes Friday, May 15.
 - Registration was already completed online. Final payments are due Friday, February 28.
 - The cost for each exam is \$94. Those who qualify for free and reduced lunch pay a reduced fee of \$62.

The deadline to apply for the Wayland Scholarship will be March 31, and applications cannot be accepted or processed without the EFC or if you miss the March 31 deadline.

- Students are also strongly encouraged to schedule time with their Guidance Counselor to review course selections for next year.

Thinking About Course Selection with a Balance in Mind and Summer Programs

Course Selection:

•The Balance of Course Selection and a Healthy Life:

The Guidance Department is continuously looking for ways to deliver the important message of students finding that important balance between challenging themselves academically and also making sure they have a healthy lifestyle too. For example, if you are someone who wants to take all honors courses because you really want to challenge yourself, will that decision cause you so much stress and anxiety that you are not able to balance the other important things in your life, like extracurricular activities, friends, family and quite simply, some down time for yourself? As you move through high school, academic demands increase, so it is important to take stock each year and plan carefully. Because Wayland is such a demanding academic environment, students at WHS report high levels of stress due to many different factors. As a means to help you (both students and parents) to think carefully about the course selection process, we have developed some discussion questions to assist you in thinking about your choices and balancing your overall schedule and life.

- On a scale of 1-10 (one being least and 10 being the most), how would you rate your level of stress on an average day?
- ⇒ What are some of the things that cause you stress?
- ➡ What are some of the ways you relieve stress?
- Are there courses at school that cause you stress?
- ⇒ Are there courses at school that help relieve your stress?
- ➡ What are your responsibilities outside of school (sports, arts, community service, employment, clubs, helping in the household, etc.)?
- ⇒ How much time do you spend each day on these activities?
- How much time do you spend on homework each night?
- How much time do you spend each day doing something you find enjoyable?
- ➡ Are the classes you are taking helping you meet your goals and learn about your interests for the future?
- ➡ What time do you want to be going to sleep? What time are you going to sleep?

The purpose of this discussion exercise is to promote thoughtfulness when considering creating a balanced schedule for next year, both inside the classroom and outside of school. We hope you will have these important discussions at home. And, as always, we ask all of our students to stop by or schedule a time with us to discuss their classes, and parents are welcome to call their student's Guidance Counselor with questions and concerns as well.


